WNS Courses Offered

WNS 210: Introduction to Women's Studies, Dr. Baker TH 12:30-1:45,

Dr. Logsdon-Conradsen MWF 10-10:50

A thought provoking class about gender and how societal norms and inequalities impact daily life. Topics include media, violence, work, family, politics, history, language, religion, law and social policy.

PSY 385I: Psychology of Women, Dr. Logsdon-Conradsen MWF 9-9:50
