SOCIOLOGY and ANTHROPOLOGY:

First Year

Along with other general-education requirements, students should complete:

MAT 111

Majors need at least 39 hours:

- 15 hours—Level 1 and Level 2 Core Courses
- 12 hours—Level 3 Courses (in area/s of concentration)
- 3 hours—Level 4 Course (Senior Project)
- 9 hours—Electives within the major

Sophomore Year

Sociology & Anthropology Concentrations. Majors may choose between two concentrations—sociology or anthropology—or majors may elect to have a dual concentration in both sociology and anthropology. A concentration in sociology consists of 12 hours of Level 3 SOC courses. A concentration in anthropology consists of 12 hours of Level 3 ANT courses. Those students who choose to have a dual concentration must complete 12 hours of Level 3 SOC courses and 12 hours of Level 3 ANT courses.

Progression through the Major. Ideally, students should progress through the following sequence of courses chronologically, taking Level 1 Courses first and finishing with the Level 4 Course. They are encouraged to take the Level 2 courses as early as possible so the information and skills acquired in them will augment learning and the quality of projects possible in Level 3 courses. Students may take Level 2 and Level 3 courses concurrently, however, they **MUST** have completed both Theory and Methods (Level 2 courses) **BEFORE** enrolling in Senior Project (Level 4).
