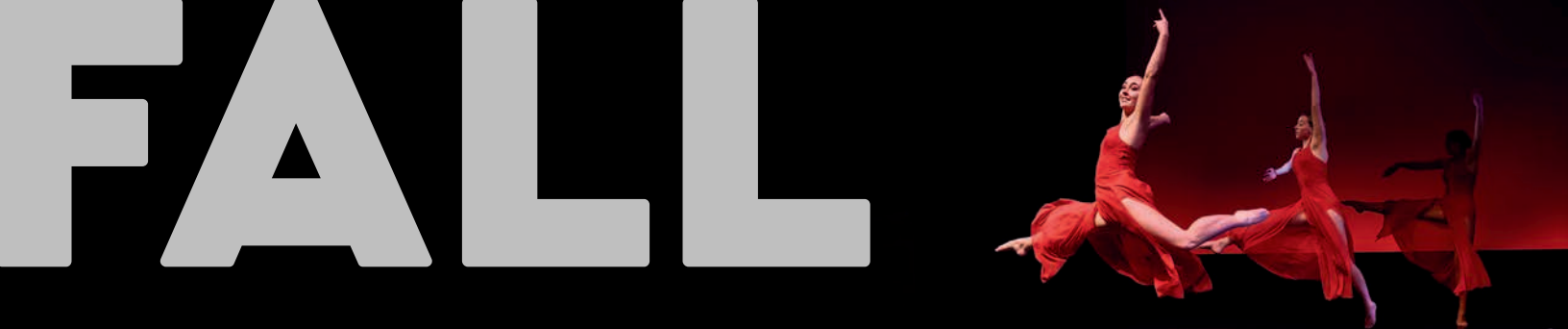

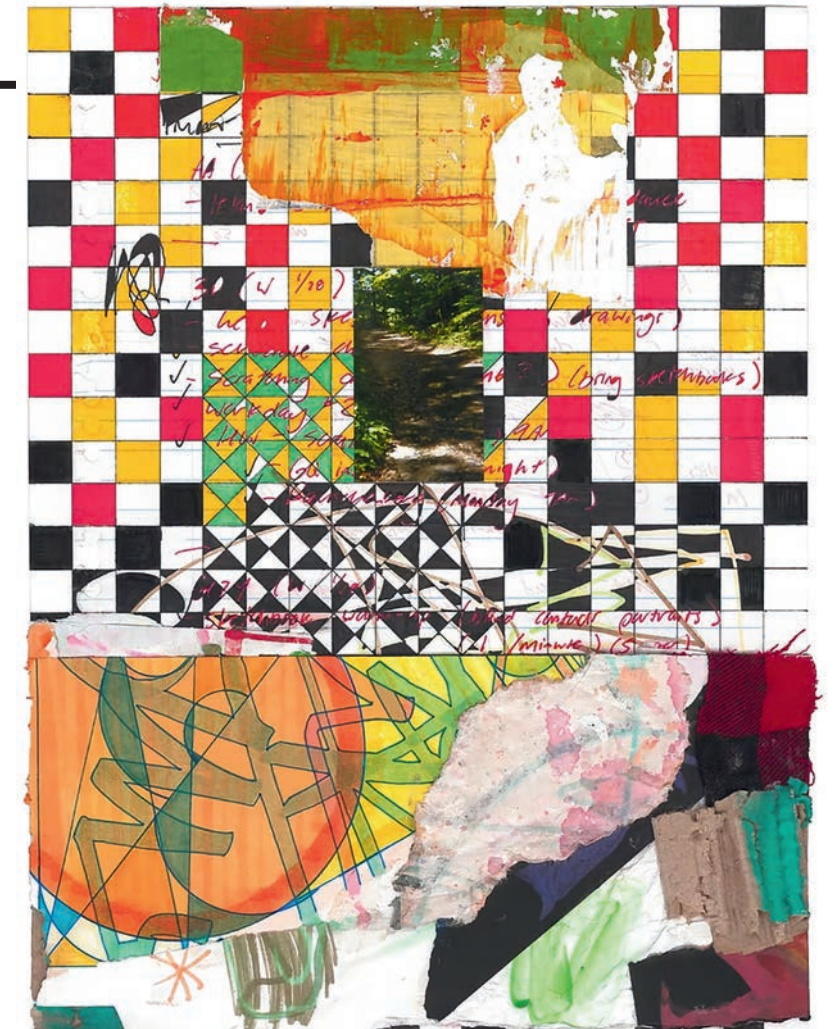

Drawing underlies many creative endeavors, at least in the preparatory phase. It also has long been a stand-alone discipline that utilizes a range of materials and techniques. Today, drawing often takes a hybrid approach, borrowing methods and procedures from other disciplines like photography or printmaking to expand its boundaries and possibilities. Milledgeville-based artist Griffin Allman adopts this attitude in largely abstract work that employs a vast array of traditional materials that are presented with and on the stuff of everyday life such as cardboard and fabric scraps, notes, and photographs. Like the last *Drawing Invitational* shown in the fall of 2022



in Moon, this iteration also presents work that fits under the large umbrella of drawing through method, materials or concept to provide a window on current drawing practices.

Bitten Apple, Tender Tooth features the work of Bailey Arend and Erin Ethridge, who are partners and colleagues in the art department at Appalachian State University. While pursuing separate practices, their work is interdisciplinary in nature and shares an often playful exploration with materials that question rigid interpretation. Ethridge combines textiles, repurposed objects, and metal to create forms that evoke clothing, construction/ playground equipment, and biological systems. These are used to explore issues such as gender, vulnerability, barriers with communication, paradoxical connections, and domesticity. Arend explores connections between the human body, materials, and ecology primarily through sculpture, as well as performance, drawing, and photography/video. His recent projects reference historical subjects with digital fabrication tools to explore the friction between subjective responses and scientific methods.

Both received their Master of Fine Arts degrees from the New York State College of Ceramics at Alfred University in Alfred, New York. Texas-born Erin Ethridge has shown work at the Mint Museum, Denison Museum, and CICA Museum, and has participated in residencies at Haystack Mountain School of Crafts, Tides Institute & Museum of Art, and Elsewhere Museum. Alaska native Bailey Arend has participated in artist residencies, including Lighthouse Works, The Bemis Center for Contemporary Art, and the Mid-Atlantic Ceramic Exchange.

Our concert will feature music from the British Isles. Folk melodies from the Scottish Highlands and Northumbria to Ireland will be represented on the program.

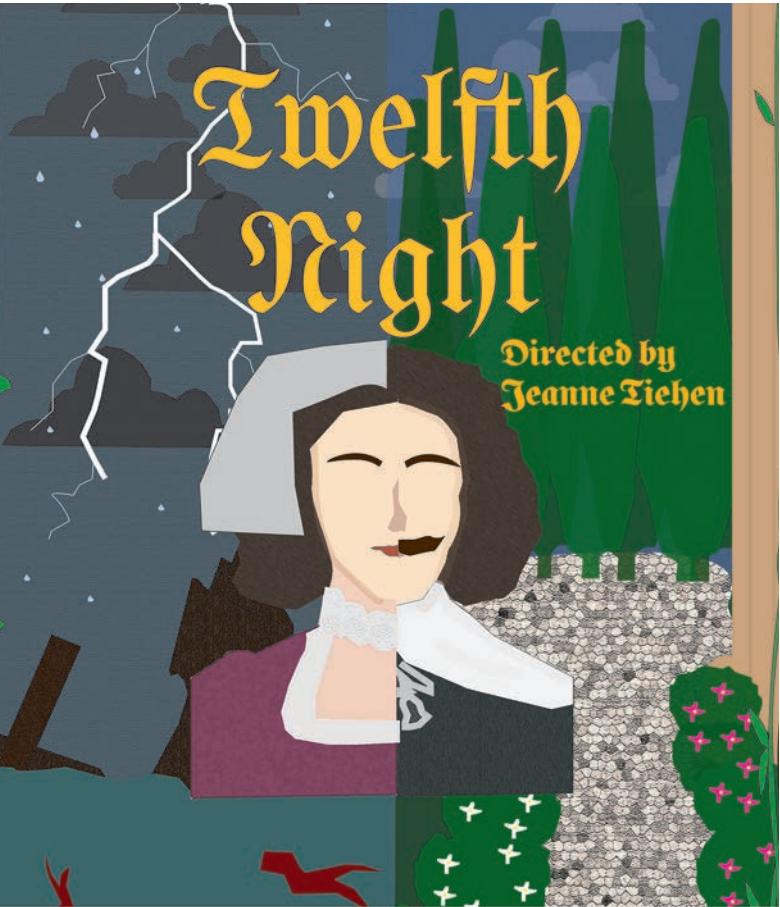

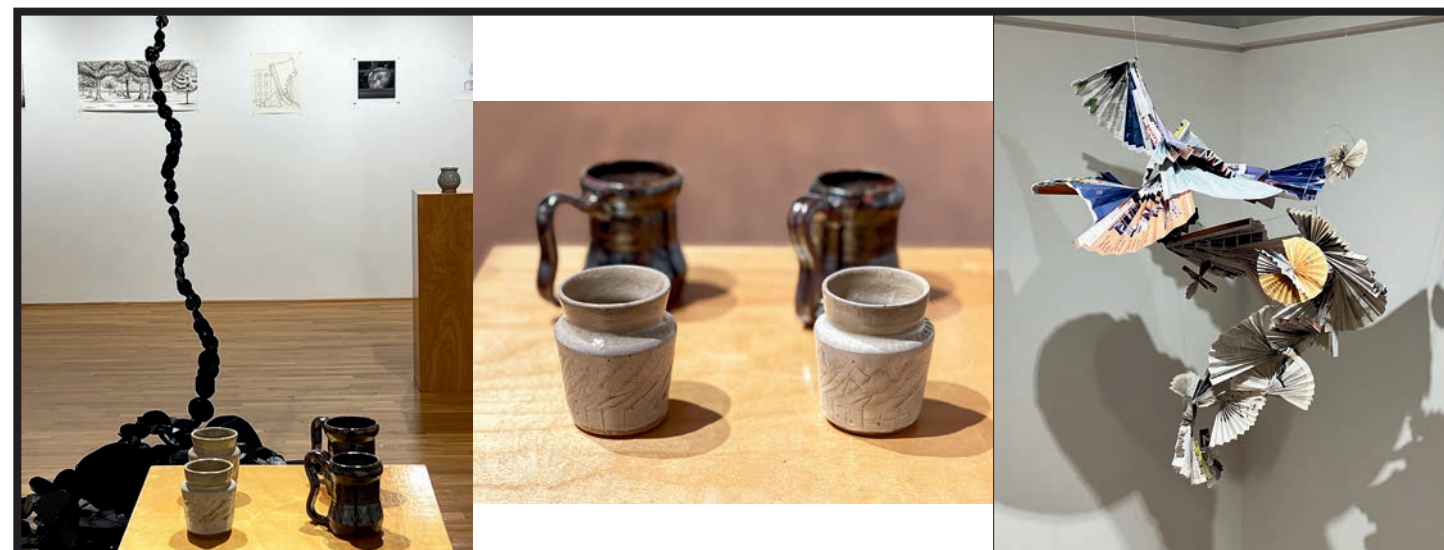

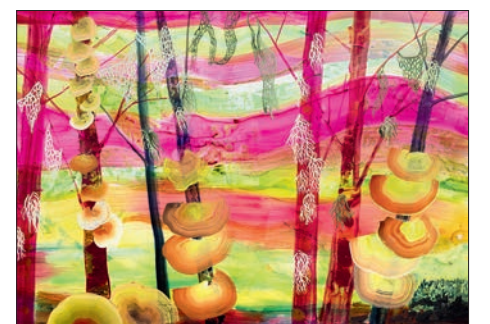
Shaping Identity features work by an art team and three artists from different backgrounds and disciplines focusing on their use of materials and how that shapes identity.

Through their award-winning design collaboration Sharon and Guy (Guy Villa Jr. and Sharon Oiga) question and explore the design process on a range of scales through experimental typography, brand identity, and publication design. Villa is an assistant professor and the coordinator of graphic design at Columbia College Chicago; Oiga is a professor and chair of graphic design at the University of Illinois Chicago.

Working from the language of painting, Herb Rieth uses repurposed materials to create large scale textile-based work. This practice ties him to a family tradition of sewing, and the creation of pieces made to honor others. Rieth is a professor of art at Pellissippi State Community College in Knoxville, Tennessee.

Through the language of painting, Jessica Mongeon investigates systems found in nature, including human biology. She works as an associate professor of art and foundations coordinator at Arkansas Tech University.

Using found objects associated with domestic spaces, Zoe Elwood explores the formation of queer identity. Specifically, habitation and the body are the focus utilizing a language of concealment, reconstruction, presence, and belonging.

Walls, Built and Shuffle (solo exhibition)

Walls, Built, and Shuffle builds on Hannah Israel's sculptural practice that employs material explorations in drawing, porcelain, print media, book arts, and papier-mâché. The resulting work focuses on issues around fragility that is fueled by process and intuition. While often ephemeral, the work navigates between creating a tangible reality connected to memory, fantasy, contemplation, and ambiguity. The work exists as discrete framed forms, suspended from the ceiling, attached to armatures, leaned against the wall, or arranged on a tables or shelves. *Walls, Built, and Shuffle* expands this practice with a participatory element centered around the Chinese game of mahjong.

Israel has been awarded numerous grants/fellowships and has exhibited her work at the Poem 88 Gallery, Whitespace Gallery, and the High Museum of Art in Atlanta, the Kentler International Drawing Space in New York City, The Vargas Museum of

Regenerative Urban Abodes is a recent body of work by Lydia Thompson, a mixed media artist specializing in ceramics. She earned her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from The Ohio State University and her Master of Fine Arts degree from the New York State College of Ceramics at Alfred University.

The work grows out of research that has been exhibited nationally (e.g. Ohr-O'Keefe Museum of Art in Biloxi, Mississippi and the Kentucky Museum of Art and Craft) as well as internationally,

including New Zealand, Denmark, and Canada. This work is based on a research trip to Ghana in the summer of 2025 funded by the Lighton International Artists Exchange Program and was developed in the fall of 2025 while Thompson served as artist in residence at Starworks in Star, North Carolina. *Regenerative Urban Abodes* is based on her study of vernacular adobe homes and traditional pottery methods in Ghana and experiments with new firing methods and surface treatments. It expands her research focused on migration and ancestral memories.

In the midst of the 1941 WWII London Blitz, teenager Alice Spencer and her best friend Alfred Hallam seek refuge in an underground tube station bunker, where civilians huddle together amid air raids. Alfred, suffering from tuberculosis, is quarantined in a restricted ward, leaving Alice desperate to see him. To comfort him, Alice pulls out their shared favorite book, *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland*, but the strict Red Cross nurse confiscates and tears it as punishment for Alice's rule breaking. Alice declares she knows the story by heart and begins reciting it aloud, drawing the bunker residents into the narrative. The group transforms into characters from the book, with Alfred becoming the frantic White Rabbit, urging Alice to follow him "down the hole" into Wonderland to escape their grim reality.
