WNS 210 A: Introduction to Women's Studies
Dr. Conradsen
MWF 10:00-10:50 AM

This introductory course to Women's and Gender Studies provides an overview of the history and current status of women, paying particular attention to diversity in women's experiences.



WI: PSY 385 I A: Psychology of Women

This writing intensive, discussion-oriented course explores the psychological, emotional, and cognitive aspects of a wide range of issues related to women.

PSY 211 I A: Human Sexuality

ENG 336 A: Gender in Modern Fiction

WNS 412 A: Women's Studies Seminar

ENG 420 A: Seminar in Genre and Theory — Representing Gender in Autobiography

This writing-intensive seminar will focus initially on early autobiographical classics then move to an investigation of how members of marginalized groups have used the special authority of the first-person singular in the last century to affirm their dignity and humanity and to challenge nationally dominant paradigms of selfhood.

ANT 360: Gender, Youth, Economic Development in Tanzania

Tanzania from May 15 - June 16

This course offers a unique opportunity for students to use this learning process by living in two different regions of Tanzania for a three-week period. The course will look will focus specifically on youths and how gender intersects with the options for economic livelihoods available to—or made by—them. Students will explore broader questions of gender and economic livelihoods by looking at schooling and informal sector economic work in these two contexts, as well as the constraints and opportunities which young people face in this nation. To provide a deeper understanding of young men and women's lives and of Tanzanian society as a whole, we will spend time in two different cultural zones in this East African country.
